SLIDE 2 · Ahsoka's Core Role Across the Saga

Ahsoka's role evolves across our three-game saga, but her function remains consistent: she is the wise, battle-hardened master and caretaker who bridges the prequel and original trilogy eras.

PREQUEL TRILOGY

Ahsoka is the Jedi Master to **Xenadu** and **Kortnei**.

She guides these two exceptionally gifted young Jedi, mentoring them through the rising tensions of their time.

ORIGINAL TRILOGY

She becomes the primary caretaker and master to **Straylus**.

Straylus is the central protagonist who will drive the time-loop narrative of the saga.

DUAL-MASTER ROLE

This dual-master role is deliberate. Ahsoka is not just teaching skills — she is passing on hard-earned wisdom forged through loss, betrayal, and resilience.

SLIDE 3 · The Emotional Core: Tragedy and Empathy

What makes Ahsoka's arc particularly powerful is the personal tragedy she relives through her students.

Ahsoka once experienced the pain of feeling abandoned and failed by her own master. In our story, she now stands on the other side of that equation. Through her relationships with Xenadu and Kortnei, she will feel the heavy burden her master once carried — the guilt of wondering whether she has done enough, whether she has failed her Padawans when they needed her most.

She will also deeply understand what Obi-Wan Kenobi felt when he lost Anakin Skywalker. Ahsoka loses a master in her past, and now, as a master herself, she confronts the possibility of losing her students to the dark side or to fate.

This dual perspective — having been both the disappointed apprentice and the fearing master — transforms her. It leads her to become deeply protective of Straylus, though she expresses it in her classic nonchalant, wry, and seemingly detached manner. Underneath the cool exterior is a Jedi who refuses to let history repeat itself.

SLIDE 4 · Timeline & Character Ages (First Game)

First Game — 30 ABY

CHARACTER AGES — 30 ABY

Ahsoka Tano — 71 years old — still incredibly capable, but carrying the visible weight of decades of conflict.

Xenadu — 18 years old — confident, talented, and bonded with his Force-sensitive companion.

Ryder — 1 year old — a young Force-sensitive Chimpoweah/Chimpoweans who rides on Xenadu's shoulder. Comic relief + emotional anchor.

Kortnei — 19 years old — Xenadu's Force-twin / love interest.

Supporting Cast — Zantrius (16), Zachariaus (16), Owen (15), Bryant (18).

This game establishes the friendships, the bonds, and the first cracks that will lead to tragedy.

SLIDE 5 · The Fall (Second Game)

SECOND GAME — 35 ABY (5 years later)

The prequel story shifts into darkness as Bryant, once a trusted friend in the group, falls to the dark side. He becomes the Sith apprentice **Zunk**, betraying his friends in pursuit of power and freedom. This betrayal hits the entire group — and Ahsoka — hard. It becomes the living embodiment of her deepest fears: losing another generation to the same cycle that claimed so many before them.

SLIDE 6 · Time Loop & Legacy (Fourth Game & Beyond)

FOURTH GAME (FIRST INSTALLMENT) — 42 ABY

In the broader Original Trilogy timeline, we reach 45 ABY, where Ahsoka is 86. By the climax involving major time travel, she is approximately **103 years old** when Straylus is 19.

Straylus sends an 86-year-old Ahsoka and his younger 3-year-old self back to **4,000 BBY**. This act creates the time loop that binds our entire saga together. Ahsoka's presence in the ancient past will have profound consequences — both for the old Republic and for her own understanding of destiny.

Later, Ahsoka becomes a Force ghost to guide Straylus in the main trilogy releases after Episode IV (the first installment).

SLIDE 7 · Closing: Why Ahsoka Matters

To summarize: Ahsoka is not a background mentor. She is the emotional and thematic heart of the saga.

She carries the pain of the past, the fear of repeating it, and the quiet hope that this new generation — Straylus — might finally break the cycle. Her protective, nonchalant guidance of Straylus is layered with everything she has learned from failure, loss, and love.

Ahsoka represents resilience, the long view of history, and the belief that even after all she has seen, it is still worth fighting for the future.

She is our Obi-Wan, our Yoda, and yet entirely herself — older, wiser, and more determined than ever.
